**TITLE:**  
Repeal and Replace: Yuma County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan

**SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:**  
Repeal Resolution R2011-30 related to the Yuma County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan 2010 and adopt a resolution supporting the updated Yuma County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan dated March 2019. (Fire Department/Administration) (Steve Irr)

**REPORT:**  
The Yuma County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation plan (Plan) has been prepared in compliance with Section 322 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act or the Act), 42 U.S.C. 5165, enacted under Sec.104 of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, (DMA 2000) Public Law 106-390 enacted October 30, 2000.

Section 104 of DMA 2000 directs states, tribes, and local governments seeking federal monies for hazard mitigation to identify and mitigate risk through mitigation planning and requires that existing plans be updated every five years, with each plan cycle requiring a complete review, revision, and re-approval of the plan at both the state and FEMA level.

The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Title 44, Section 201.6 states that a local government must have a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved local mitigation plan in order to apply for and/or receive project grant funding from various mitigation programs.

Members of the City of Yuma Fire, Police, and Community Development Departments, working with the Yuma County Multi-Jurisdictional Planning Team completed the required five-year update of the Plan used to identify potential risks to our region, critical infrastructure, costs to repair and/or projects to reduce risk to that infrastructure.

The Plan has been submitted to, and approved by, the State of Arizona Division of Emergency Management (ADEM) and FEMA, and is now being returned for adoption by Yuma County and the incorporated communities within Yuma County.
