Financial Briefing

Rodriguez thanked City Council for their support and all of the City departments including Financial Services, City Administration, and the City Attorney's Office for accomplishing the recent refinancing which will save current and future taxpayers about \$74 million.

Marlin presented the Fiscal Year 2021 6+6 Financial Report as follows:

• The City has increased revenues from the same quarter last year by \$5.8 million over several areas, including most notably a more than \$1.5 million increase in City Sales Tax revenue

 - o In the General Fund alone, revenues were up by \$2.1 million and expenditures were down by \$630,000 for a total variance of \$2.7 million

Discussion

- It would be helpful as budget season approaches to see information on where the City stands as far as budgeted versus actual revenues and expenditures (Mayor Nicholls)
- A mid-year budgeted versus actual comparison can be misleading, for example due to some debt payments that only happen twice a year which may skew the data (Marlin)
- The City is in an excellent position financially, and staff will reflect on how to maintain that going forward keeping in mind the uncertainty of the resolution of the COVID-19 pandemic (Rodriguez)

Motion Consent Agenda Item B.3 – Grant Award: Arizona Companion Animal Spay and Neuter Committee (Execute the necessary paperwork to disperse awarded grant funds to support community spay and neuter surgeries) (YPD)

Discussion

- This grant award is for all animals and is not specific to feral cats (Watts/Smith)
- The \$20,000 award amount is from two separate awards of \$10,000 each (Morris/Smith)
- The City receives this grant every year, and all of the funds are expended each year (Morris/Smith)

Motion (Knight/McClendon): To approve the Motion Consent Agenda as recommended. Voice vote: **approved** 6-0.

B. Approval of Staff Recommendations:

- 1. Executive Sessions may be held at the next regularly scheduled Special Worksession, Regular Worksession and City Council Meeting for personnel, legal, litigation and real estate matters pursuant to A.R.S. § 38-431.03 Section A (1), (3), (4), and (7). (City Atty)
- 2. Authorize the purchase of First Aid and Medical Supplies, utilizing the City of Mesa's cooperative purchase agreement with the option to renew for four additional one-year periods, one period at a time, depending on the appropriation of funds and satisfactory performance. II. RESOLUTION CONSENT AGENDA

<u>Resolution R2021-001</u> – Order Improvements: Municipal Improvement District No. 114 (serving 2nd Avenue between 10th and 12th Streets) (ENG)

Discussion

- The cost of the improvements are assessed on the properties within the Municipal Improvement District (MID) each year (Morris/Short)
- If a property is sold, the assessment will be transferred to the new property owner; any prospective property owners will be made aware of the MID because it will be included in the title report (Mayor Nicholls/Morris/Short)
- Property owners within the MID have been notified of the cost through a notice on their door, or via mail for those who are not local, as well as through two public outreach events (**Shelton/Short**)
- The cost of the project ended up being much lower than expected, and the design was able to address additional issues brought up by the residents such as flooding (**Knight/Short**)

Motion (Knight/Shelton): To adopt the Resolution Consent Agenda as recommended.

Bushong displayed the following title:

Resolution R2021-001

A resolution of the City Council of the City of Yuma, Arizona, ordering improvements for Municipal Improvement District No. 114 serving 2nd Avenue between 10th Street and 12th Street, to construct and install curb, gutter, sidewalk and streetlighting improvements on 2nd Avenue between 10th and 12th Streets as more particularly described in this resolution, and declaring the improvements to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and the cost of the improvements shall be assessed upon Municipal Improvement District No. 114; improvements shall be performed under Arizona Revised

Statutes (A.R.S.) Title 48, Chapter 4, Article 2 (to provide a dedicated funding stream and an opportunity for neighborhood input) (ENG)

Roll call vote: adopted 6-0.

III. Introduction of Ordinances

Introduction of Ordinance O2021-002 – Zoning Code Text Amendment: Recreational Marijuana
Establishments (amend Title 15, Chapter 154, Article 22 of the Yuma City Code to update provisions related to Non-Profit Medical Marijuana Dispensaries and Recreational Marijuana Establishments) (DCD)

Motion (Knight/Shelton): To amend Ordinance O2021-002, Section 1, subsection §154-22.01 titled Purpose to add a revised version of the last strikethrough sentence so that the last sentence reads, "Furthermore, the City of Yuma does not condone the use of marijuana or violation of Federal law." Voice vote: **approved** 6-0

Speaker

• Pele Fischer, attorney with Peacock Legal, began by noting that Proposition 207 allows localities to enact reasonable zoning regulations; however, ordinances may not be more restrictive than a comparable ordinance that applies to medical marijuana dispensaries or make operation of a marijuana establishment unduly burdensome. Fischer opined that the proposed ordinance as presented would essentially prohibit a marijuana establishment that does not hold both non-profit medical and recreational licensing from operating in the City, but would not limit the number of marijuana-related businesses in the City as long as they hold the appropriate licenses. Fisher asked City Council to consider the consequences of closing the door on the time-restricted license allocation and missing out on potential Transaction Privilege Tax revenue and well-paying jobs with benefits for Yuma's citizens.

<u>Introduction of Ordinance O2021-003</u> – Repeal Yuma City Code §§ 211-09 and 211-10: Traffic Rules (regarding the use of portable communication devices while driving) (City Atty)

Discussion

• State law changed to essentially mirror what the City already had in place, and that redundancy could lead to confusion; any enforcement of texting while driving will be under the state law rather than the City ordinance (Watts/Files)

Bushong displayed the following titles:

Ordinance O2021-002

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Yuma, Arizona, amending Chapter 154 of the Yuma City Code, as amended, providing for changes to the Zoning Code, Article 22, related to recreational marijuana establishments, and providing penalties for violation thereof (requires recreational marijuana

establishments to co-locate with non-profit medical marijuana dispensaries in a single location within the same building) (DCD)

Ordinance O2021-003

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Yuma, Arizona, repealing Chapter 211 §§ 09 and 10 of the Yuma City Code relating to the operation of portable communications devices while driving (the use of portable wireless communication devices while driving is now regulated by state law) (City Atty)

Ordinance O2021-004

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Yuma, Arizona, authorizing and approving the execution of a Preannexation Development and Property Disposition Agreement with the owner of real property located at 414 South Vaughn Avenue and declaring certain right-of-way, hereafter described, surplus for City use and authorizing the dedication of the surplus right-of-way to Yuma County pursuant to the Preannexation Development and Property Disposition Agreement (approximately 4.26 acres of vacant property located outside of the corporate boundary of the City of Yuma) (ENG)
